Morgans Primary Long Term Music Plan for 2024-2025

Our weekly music curriculum is designed in line with the National Curriculum - model music curriculum, other government guidance and the Ofsted Music subject report 2023-2024.

How students progress in music is designed around 5 essential strands:

- Listening and evaluating
- Creating sound
- Notation
- Improvising and composing
- Singing and performing

Wherever possible, links are made across the curriculum, to explore further concepts, but also to reinforce and recap learnings. It is important that children develop the ability to make links so that they can see that nothing happens in isolation. Children will be encouraged to think about previous learning when starting a new topic as well as throughout each unit. English- reading and writing- where appropriate, we link reading to the music curriculum. While we do not expect there to be long extended writing opportunities in foundation lessons, we do expect children to be given the opportunity to write, using the vocabulary learning and within reflections of learning. We expect writing to be of the same quality within English books and encourage age related expectations.
