Aims

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Beginning of the school day

- Queens and Mandeville school gates will be open at 8.40am.
- The children line up outside of their classrooms.
- At 8:43, an adult will open the door so that all children can be sat down ready to learn for 8:45



The end of the school day

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At end of the school day the gates will open promptly at 3.05pm and close at 3.30pm.



Preparation for Year 2

- Please ensure you follow the uniform guidelines and name **all** of your child's clothing including shoes.
- A named PE kit in a named bag should also be sent with your child. Children should have their PE kits in school every day. These will be sent home half termly for washing.
- Named water bottle every day.
- Stationery/pencil cases are not required in KS1 as essential items are provided.

4. Expectations for school uniform

4.1 Our school uniform

The following items are part of our essential school uniform:

Navy blue v-necked jumper/sweatshirt or cardigan. Hoodies are not permitted Light blue polo shirt Grey trousers, shorts, skirt or pinafore dress

Light blue, round neck PE t-shirt

Plain navy blue PE shorts (not cycling shorts)

PE trainers (velcro unless pupil can tie laces)

Black school shoes - trainers, boots, sandals or shoes with heels are not permitted Black/grey/white socks or tights

Optional school uniform

- Navy blue jumper/cardigan with school logo
- Light blue PE t-shirt with school logo
- Plain (not branded) navy blue joggers/tracksuit for PE during winter months
- Light blue gingham summer dresses during summer term (until Autumn half term)



- We continue to complete teacher assessments which may use some previous SATs material. We may choose to complete the 2025 SAT's but only for our own assessment.

Home Learning

- Please read at home every day (write a comment in reading records in black or blue). We will check reading records regularly.
- Spellings New Spelling Scheme being introduced, will update shortly.
- Times Tables Rockstars logins will be provided in their reading record. It is an automated system that will move children on when they regularly achieve an answer in the recommended time.
- Handwriting We will be completing handwriting practice regularly in school but if you are looking for a little bit extra, this is a great place to help.
- Any communication will be sent out via ParentMail, or link parent when required.

e-Safety across Key Stage 1

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• Children must not publish images of other pupils



- Please ensure your child is using their device under your supervision
- Minimum ages for Instagram (13+), WhatsApp (16+), Facebook (13+), Snapchat (13+)
- We will contact you if we suspect a pupil is misusing their device
- Talk about your child's eSafety with them so they know they can come to you or any school adult with problems
- It is important that pupils feel safe to discuss worries and that they will not lose access to their device if they do make a mistake

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Pupil Premium



There are so many benefits available to you:

Children qualify for <u>free school meals</u> – and accordingly pupil premium – if you receive any of the following benefits:

- Universal credit (provided you have a net income of £7400 or less)
- Income support
- Income-based jobseekers' allowance
- Income-related employment and support allowance
- Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of state pension credit
- Child tax credit, provided that you are not also entitled to working tax
- D credit and have an annual gross income of £16,190 or less
