


| Botanical art | To depict whole plants or parts of plants that is visually pleasing and scientifically accurate. |
| Composition | Putting different elements together in a pleasing way. |
| Geometric | A regular shape with angles and straight lines. |
| Organic | Irregular natural shapes. |
| Scale | The size of what is being drawn. |
| Shading | Drawn marks to show areas of light and dark. |
| Texture | A surface quality that is not flat. |
| Tone | The light and dark something is. |




Everything in our world is made from simple shapes. Identifying shapes within objects will help you to draw more accurately.
















Shading grip


The four rules of shading

To shade in ONE direction


To not leave any gaps

To work neatly to the edges

To create smooth even tones



Creating tones:



Dark tones
show where
there is less
light on an
object. Pressing
firmly with your
pencil when you
shade will
create darker
tones.

Light tones
show where
there is more
light on the
ubject and less
pressure is
needed when
you shade.
