Preparation for Year 6

- A named PE kit in a named bag should be sent with your child on the first day back. Children should have their PE kits in school every day.
- Named water bottle every day.
- Small clear pencil case.

Uniform





The following items are part of our **essential** school uniform:

- Navy blue v-necked jumper/sweatshirt or cardigan. Hoodies are not permitted
- Light blue polo shirt
- Grey trousers, shorts, skirt or pinafore dress
- Light blue, round neck PE t-shirt
- Plain navy blue PE shorts (not cycling shorts)
- PE trainers (velcro unless pupil can tie laces)
- Black school shoes trainers, boots, sandals or shoes with heels are not permitted
- Plain Black or white socks or grey socks or tights

Optional school uniform

- Navy blue jumper/cardigan with school logo
- Light blue PE t-shirt with school logo
- Plain (not branded) navy blue joggers/tracksuit for PE during winter months
- Light blue gingham summer dresses during summer term (until Autumn half term)

Important notes:

- Jewellery single or pair of stud earrings (**no hoops**). These must be removed for PE lessons. However, in exceptional circumstances children can provide their own tape to cover their earrings. No other jewellery is permitted at any other time apart from watches (not smart watches or fitbits).
- Hair longer than shoulder length must be tied back.
- Hair styles should be appropriate for school.
- Only plain black, blue or white hair bands or scrunchies are allowed.

Important: if any of the above regulations are problematic for religious, cultural or medical reasons, the issue must be brought to the attention of the Headteacher. A discretionary decision may be made in such cases.

Equipment




Children should bring in a clear pencil case with the following items: (please name items where possible)

- Highlighters (2 are sufficient)

No biros required, a handwriting pen will be provided by the school.







Medical

If your child suffers from asthma, allergies or any other medical condition please notify the school office by email. You will be asked to complete a medical information form to give us further details which will be recorded on our management information system, Arbor and your child's teacher notified. If your child has an asthma inhaler or epipen we must keep these in school. Please ensure these are handed to the school office. It is the parent's responsibility to ensure the school are given a new inhaler or epipen on expiry of the previous one.

Nurturing Life-Long Learning



We support learning at home in a variety of different ways

- The children are expected to read at home every day. Children have the choice to read to themselves or an adult. However, an adult must sign the daily reading record to confirm their child/ren have read.
- A weekly Maths task and Spelling, Punctuation & Grammar task will be set from a CGP Homework book. The task will usually be inline with what is being covered in class. This will be set on a Thursday and will be due in the following Tuesday. The first copy of the CPG Homework books will be provided by Morgans School; however, if your child loses their copy or their copy is broken/destroyed, you will be responsible for purchasing a replacement.



Spellings

We follow the ESSENTIAL spelling scheme. Children will be revisiting previous years patterns before moving on to more complex spelling patterns. There will be dictations in class, however please focus on the common exception words from Year 3 onwards at home (next slide).

Year 6 Independence!

- Year 6 pupils may walk home <u>if parents have completed a consent form and returned it to the</u> <u>class teacher</u>
- They may bring a mobile phone to school only if they are walking home alone and <u>have a</u> completed mobile phone consent form
- We advise that children should walk in pairs or groups if possible
- Phones must be switched off on school premises they must be turned off/back on at the gates
- If we see pupils using phones on school property, they will be confiscated and returned to parents
- Mobile phones must be handed in to the classroom box/basket in the morning and then collected at the end of the school day.

e-Safety across Key Stage 2

Children must not publish images of other pupils



- Please ensure your child is using their device under your supervision
- Minimum ages for Instagram (13+), WhatsApp (16+), Facebook (13+),
 Snapchat (13+)
- We will contact you if we suspect a pupil is misusing their device
- Talk about your child's eSafety with them so they know they can come to you or any school adult with problems
- It is important that pupils feel safe to discuss worries and that they will not lose access to their device if they do make a mistake

If you make the decision to give your child a phone, we suggest you use a parental control app such as Google Family Link or Qustodio to monitor your child's phone use closely, and that you actively supervise all online activity.





Pupil Premium



There are so many benefits available to you:

Children qualify for <u>free school meals</u> – and accordingly pupil premium – if you receive any of the following benefits:

- Universal credit (provided you have a net income of £7400 or less)
- Income support
- Income-based jobseekers' allowance
- Income-related employment and support allowance
- Support under Part IV of the Immigration and Asylum Act 1999
- The guaranteed element of state pension credit
- Child tax credit, provided that you are not also entitled to working tax credit and have an annual gross income of £16,190 or less
